# What does a team manager do?

The adult team manager may be a parent, relative, or anyone over the age of 18 who will serve as a liaison between the team and the libraries. The team manager is responsible for filling out the registration form, keeping the team members motivated, arranging meetings with their team (if desired) and ensuring that all the team members arrive at the Battle by 5:45 pm. Team managers also assist during the Battle.

# What is the procedure for the Battle?

The Battle will be held Wednesday, March 6, 2024 at the Chartiers Valley Intermediate School. <u>Team members must arrive by 5:45 pm.</u> The Battle starts at 6:00 pm. There are two rounds. Each round will consist of 10 questions...there is one question per book (tie breaker questions will be used only if necessary). The moderator will read a question. The team will have 30 seconds to decide and write an answer. The answer to each question will be a book title and the author's last name.

### Each question is worth a possible 5 points:

- 4 points for a correct book title
- 1 point for the correct author's last name.

Answers must be spelled correctly to receive points. Answers must be written exactly as indicated on "Answer Sheet."

classroom, a boy and his friends fail to draw him out but try a new plan after learning he is a Syrian refugee.




Dungeon Academy: No Humans Allowed! by Madeleine Roux

Pub. 2021 (AR BL 3.6) 160 pages


When Lucas decides to skip school because he wants to discuss football with a firefighter friend of his father, he finds himself caught up in the terrorist attacks on New York City.
